Paper 3: Protest, Agitation and Parliamentary Reform in Britain, 1780-1928

Aspect in Breadth – changes in representation in England, c.1780-1928 Changing influences in parliament: The impact of parliamentary reform. The influence of the crown and aristocracy, including influence on elections and parliament and the reasons for declining influence in the House of Commons. Changes in political parties, including their role in parliament and in elections, the growth of the Labour Party and the extent of change in the social makeup of the House of Commons.

Coursework Component Independent Critical Analysis of Historians' Interpretations: Constructing an argument and applying critical perspective to a question of pupils' own design regarding the Unification of Italy.

Critical analysis and evaluation historians' interpretations of the Reagan administration including economic policy, social change, reduction of 'big government', extent of revitalisation, legacy.

Paper 1: Searching for Rights and Freedoms in the 20th century, In search of the American Dream: USA, 1917-1980

Breadth study of the USA to explore and critically analyse key events, people, and change over time. The changing political environment, The quest for civil rights, Society and culture in change, The changing quality of life.

Paper 2: Searching for Rights and Freedoms in the 20th century, South Africa, 1948-94: From apartheid state to 'rainbow nation'

Depth study of race relations in South Africa to explore the key features of the period and use knowledge and understanding to analyse sources. The response to apartheid, Radicalisation of resistance and the consolidation of National Party power, Redefining resistance and challenges to National Party power, The end of apartheid and the creation of the 'rainbow nation'

Introduction to the Course: South Africa from apartheid state to 'rainbow nation' Exploration and study of South Africa up to 1948. Identifying key elements of the nation's history so that students have a contextual understanding of the state of affairs and race relations in South Africa.



Introduction to the Course: In Search of the American Dream

Exploration and study of the USA up to 1917. Identifying key elements of the nation's establishment so that students can make links to the course and have a contextual understanding of key features of the USA socially, geographically, and politically.
